

Sample Timeline for Pre-Veterinary Students*



- 7 Year**
- CONTACT your pre-vet mentor to discuss veterinary school requirements
 - CONNECT through the Pre-Vet Canvas page
 - JOIN the Pre-Vet Club ---strongly suggested (all 4 years)
 - TAKE advantage of special speakers, field trips, etc. (all 4 years)
 - GAIN experience working for a veterinarian (shadow, volunteer, or paid)
 - CREATE a resume of high school clubs, sports, activities, jobs, and leadership
 - KEEP a log of all veterinary and animal experience (high school and college)
 - GRADES, GRADES, GRADES - develop strong study habits and set an excellent foundation now
 - GET tutors in chemistry, math or other courses if you need them!
 - MEET with pre-vet mentors regularly and COMMUNICATE with them prior to changing your schedule
 - APPLY for all scholarships available (all 4 years)

- Second Year**
- GRADES, GRADES, GRADES - maintain strong grades even with hefty course loads
 - MINIMIZE having any "W"s on your transcript
 - CONSIDER who will be writing your letters of recommendation: veterinarian, academic person, and person of your choice
 - CONTINUE to get experience with veterinarians and different types of animals (large, small, exotic, lab animal, etc.)
 - SEEK leadership roles in clubs and organizations
 - OBTAIN community service experience - working with people is important too!
 - INVESTIGATE vet schools of interest and note any additional course requirements you need (outside of your major)
 - COMPLETE your plan of study with a degree advisor!

- Third Year**
- GRADES, GRADES, GRADES - keep them up during rigorous upper-level coursework
 - CONTINUE with meaningful veterinary and animal experience, leadership, community service
 - THINK about gaining experience in different circumstances: veterinarians at horse or dog shows, racetracks, livestock expos, zoos, diagnostic labs, therapy, alternative medicine, etc.
 - CONTINUE to document all college activities - extracurriculars, achievements, research - for your application
 - DETERMINE if your chosen schools require the CASPER or GRE exams and WHEN you need to take them
 - TAKE Biochemistry 401G, and if needed Microbiology 308/309
 - CONSIDER your plan B if you do not get in to Vet School (re-apply? retake classes? switch gears?)

- Fourth Year**
- GRADES, GRADES, GRADES (average for accepted KY students is 3.5/4.0)
 - COMPLETE your VMCAS application and residency forms by announced deadline, including transcripts and residency requirements
 - REVIEW interview types and ATTEND mock interviews
 - CONTINUE rigorous coursework and FINISH STRONG in case you need to re-apply
 - GRADUATE!
 - CELEBRATE getting into vet school, or implement your Plan B
 - KEEP your Pre-vet mentors in the loop!
